

## **Dense Breast Survey: Frequently Asked Questions**

### **1. How do I know if I have dense breasts?**

You will have received a results letter from BreastScreen WA recently. For women with dense breasts, it will state “Dense Breasts” in the box at the top and the body of the letter would have provided information on breast density.

Re: Screening Mammogram 24-NOV-2017  
No evidence of breast cancer  
Dense Breasts – Medical breast examination recommended  
Next mammogram recommended in 2 years

Your recent screening mammogram showed no evidence of breast cancer. We recommend that you have your next mammogram in two years' time. Women are invited until the age of 74. From the age of 75 invitation letters are not sent but women are welcome to attend.

Mammography can detect 70 - 90% of breast cancers. However, a small number of cancers cannot be seen on a mammogram.

The screening mammogram showed that your breasts are dense. Mammograms are significantly less sensitive in diagnosing breast cancer in women with dense breasts. A clinical breast examination is important and we recommend that you see your family doctor for this to be done. We would encourage you to talk to your family doctor about having your breasts checked regularly. Breast lumps, nipple discharges, changes in the breast shape or in the skin of the breast, or new and persistent breast pain should not be ignored. If any of these develop we recommend you see your family doctor as soon as possible.

### **2. What should I do if I have dense breasts?**

If your results letter indicated that you have dense breasts, we recommend that you see your family doctor for a clinical breast examination.
