BreastScreen Australia Conference



PreastScreen WA was well represented at the BreastScreen Australia conference in Adelaide in April 2018.

Five oral and one poster presentation were accepted and long-time employee Marjorie Barron received an award for completing 100,000 mammograms.

The opening plenary on Thursday 19 April saw a fascinating presentation by "futurist" Mandy Simpson that set the tone of the conference.

First up for BSWA was Fiona Smith delivering the success story of the Secure GP Messaging Project - Digital delivery of results. After Fiona, Glenys Campbell delivered an informative radiographers ergonomics session *Put yourself in my position*. Rounding out the first day was Kelly Cameron's

Managing Rural/Remote Partnerships presentation which garnered a lot of interest especially by SA and QLD delegates who could draw some parallels with their Aboriginal communities.

Carolyn Madeley presented on the second day on The Introduction of CESM into a BreastScreen Assessment Clinic discussing the clinical trial looking at the usefulness of adding Contrast Enhanced Spectral Mammography to the assessment of women with dense breasts screened through BSWA and recalled for assessment. Coby Pearson took questions on the poster presentation on how BSWA has been turning our lapsed attendee data in to **bookings**. On the final day Coby presented on the many factors influencing screening participation rates including competing demands for women's time and the strategies BSWA adopts to encourage women in the workforce to make time for themselves.

The fitting finale was the entertaining and at times controversial Panel Discussion on Open disclosure of mammographic density of which WA is the only state that does. Assoc. Prof Jennifer Stone assured all that the sky has not fallen down in WA after telling women about their breast density over the last ten years.

All BSWA representatives reflected positively on the value of being at the conference - the networking with colleagues in similar positions over the country, the sharing of ideas and the experience of presenting our knowledge and successes.
