In 2009, Donna was diagnosed with stage 3 breast cancer at the age of 44.

Once declared cancer free Donna made it her life's mission to educate as many people as possible about breast awareness and breast cancer stating that "life was too short, and I sold my house, threw in my job and bought an RV. I'm totally self-funded. It's all about spreading awareness."

Donna took time in October to visit BreastScreen WA's recently opened Albany clinic where she met with clinic staff, spoke to local community



members and directed ladies to go and have their screening mammogram done in the newly established clinic.



Donna will soon return home to Dubbo where she is a part time receptionist at BreastScreen NSW, charity worker and doting grandmother.

Increasing screening access for working women



Boronia Mobile Unit outside Parliment House

During October and November, the Boronia mobile unit pulled into Parliament House, King Edward Memorial Hospital KEMH) and QEII as part of the initiative to increase access to screening for working women. This initiative was well received screening a total of approximately 441 women across all three locations. The visits to Parliament House and KEMH coincided with breast cancer awareness month. Having the Boronia mobile van in such prominent locations during this time was a fantastic reminder for women to keep up to date with their screening mammograms. The visits were so successful and over subscribed that longer visits are scheduled to take place next year.

Aboriginal LEAD Program
