Farewell to Gagan



Flood destroys East Perth - Mardalup





The damage caused by the flood at East Perth - Mardalup clinic


In the afternoon of Boxing Day 2021, notification was received of a flood event at the East Perth - Mardalup Clinic, with 0.5 meters of flood water. The building water sprinkler system had burst a 150mm main just outside the back door resulting in a massive deluge of water flooding our tenancy, the carpark and the reception.

The clinic back door had to be forced open by the Fire Department to release most of the water. However, there was still standing water to the height of about 2cm on all floors. Cleaners were employed to help remove water, an electrician was called out to make the area safe and water extractors were hired in an attempt to salvage the clinic. A big thank you to BreastScreen WA staff Susan Greenwood, Kerri Bradford and Carolyn Madeley who worked tirelessly to help with the mammoth task of making the premises safe and secure.

We are currently in the process of seeking quotes for the building repairs and are hoping to have the clinic back up and operational later in the year.

Joondalup clinic update

The construction of the new Joondalup clinic is progressing well and is currently scheduled to be completed in April 2022. From the photographs, you will notice the concrete has been repaired following installation of the clinic hydraulics and the wall sheeting has commenced. National funding to improve participation



CRG Member Associate Professor Jennifer Stone from the School of Population and Global Health at the University of Western Australia has been awarded more than \$800,000 to support new research investigating obesity-related barriers to mammographic screening.

In collaboration with BreastScreen WA, the BreastScreenPlus project will focus on improving the mammogram experience, particularly for women in larger bodies, with the aim of increasing breast cancer screening participation.

Regular mammographic screening increases early-detection and thereby, improves breast cancer outcomes. By directly addressing barriers to screening participation, particularly for women with obesity who are at increased risk, the study has the potential to improve breast cancer survival. The study may also benefit the additional 30 per cent of the screening population who are overweight.
